
### Problem 1 (5 parts, no partial credit on each part, 4 pts for each part):







## Problem 5 (20 pts):

A simple pendulum is made of a spherical solid glass marble 1 cm in radius hanging from a length of fishing line. (Please neglect the obvious complication of attaching a spherical marble to fishing line.) The density of the glass in the marble is 2.5x103 kg/m3. For comparison, the density of water is 1x10<sup>3</sup> kg/m<sup>3</sup>.

(a) The pendulum is made to swing in air with small oscillations and the period is measured to be 2 seconds. What is the distance from the point of support of the fishing line to the center of the marble, i.e., what is the length of the pendulum? (Please ignore air resistance.)
